





Study Abroad and Study Away

Alumni Spotlight

After graduating from Jacksonville State University in 2017 with a bachelor's in music education, I began working full time as the assistant band director at Minor Middle School in Adamsville, Alabama. During my two years with Minor, I was able to start a percussion ensemble that performed at the Alabama Day of Percussion, organize various programs and performances for the school, take charge of certain recruiting and fundraising efforts for our 230 band students, and earn superior ratings at Music Performance Assessment both years. I enjoyed being able to serve the students in the Minor community.



After gaining an interest in education policy during my time at JSU, I wanted a broader understanding of education and other public interests in America. I began reading, visiting with professors, and even speaking at state and national conferences on the topic of diversity in schools and what we can do to meet the needs of all of our students. I was fortunate to accept a position in 2019 as the assistant band director at Pinson Valley High School. High school is a little different, but I've been able to reach even more students by starting a middle and high school percussion ensemble, organizing performances and events, planning and executing a field trip to the Percussive Arts Society International Convention and the Bands of

America Grand National Championships in Indiana, and perhaps the most rewarding, hosting a weekly drum circle for students with special needs that performed at the Alabama Music Educators Association Conference in Montgomery. Though I aim to eventually pursue these issues at a higher level (I'm currently working on a masters in Public Administration at UAB), I want to first continue in my career as a band director because I have seen countless times how music gives so many of our students a path to happiness and success, compassion and empathy for others, as well as a lifelong love and appreciation for the arts.







My favorite memory with the JSU Honors Program was of course our trip to China in 2014. I honestly still can't believe I got to go! That was my first time on an airplane, and it was definitely one to remember. The jetlag, countless travel hours, and calls from family members at weird hours of the night were all worth it in order to experience a culture so different from my own. I enjoyed taking the different classes- music, art/calligraphy, Chinese language, and the general novelty of being somewhere new. My favorite experiences almost always involved food. The president's dinner (so much wine), fancy Pizza Hut, a twostory KFC, the incredible street food, and even just breakfast and lunch each day were always worth looking forward to. I don't think I've ever eaten that much rice in my life, and my chopsticks skills were refined due to the lack of forks. The scenery was beautiful, especially on the wall at Linhai, in its temples, and in the surrounding mountains. I'm amazed at the incredible bond we made with our student guides in such a short amount of time. I learned that in so many ways, they were just like us- they like naps, food, hanging out with friends, and some were even English majors because they didn't like math (I can totally relate). I'm so grateful to the ISU Honors Program for what may be one of the most defining moments of my life, as it took me completely out of my comfort zone in every way possible, and I'm certainly a better person because of it. I encourage anyone that has the opportunity to join the Honors Program. You never know how it could change your life.
