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Jacksonville State University

History

From modest beginnings, Jacksonville State University has evolved into the educational center of northeast Alabama. The Alabama Legislature, in the 1882-83 session, created a state normal school when Governor Edward O'Neal signed into law a bill creating the school on February 22, 1883. Jacksonville State Normal School acquired the facilities and equipment of Calhoun College, consisting of twelve acres of land and a two-story brick building. The Board of Directors elected James C. Ryals, Jr. as the first president. The school opened with three instructors: W. J. Borden, mathematics; Eliza A. Bowen, English; and Ida J. Woodward, primary department.

The Normal School remained in operation until 1930 when it became Jacksonville State Teachers College, reflecting an increasingly higher education role for the Institution. Five years later, the College earned regional accreditation from the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. In 1957, the name again changed to Jacksonville State College when the first graduate program - the master's degree in elementary education - was created.

On August 2, 1966, the State Board of Education was authorized to elevate the College to university status. On August 17, 1967, the Legislature established an independent Board of Trustees for the University and divested jurisdiction from the State Board of Education.

Presidents

Jacksonville State University has been served by twelve presidents: James G. Ryals, Jr. (1883-85); J. Harris Chappel (1885-86); Carlton Bartlett Gibson (1886-92); J. B. Jarrett (1892-93); Jacob Forney, IV (1893-99); Clarence William Daugette (1899-1942); Houston Cole (1942-71); Ernest Stone (1971-81); Theron E. Montgomery (1981-86); Harold J. McGee (1986-99); William A. Meehan (1999-2015); and John M. Beehler (2015-present).

Economic Impact on Calhoun and Etowah Counties

The direct local expenditure of the University, faculty, staff, legacy students and retirees is approximately \$327.6 million. This amount is composed of \$27.0 million spent by faculty and staff, \$83.0 million spent by students, \$184.7 million by legacy students, \$8.0 million spent by retirees and \$24.8 million (excluding wages and salaries) spent by the University. The direct impact of \$327.6 million with the multiplier or re-spending resulted in a total of \$589.8 million. The University employs 1,107 persons in various faculty and staff positions. In addition to these jobs, 13,000 jobs exist because of the direct and indirect University-related spending.

Accreditation

Jacksonville State University is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges to award bachelor's, master's, educational specialist, and doctoral degrees. 

2017 Operating Expenditures Budget Student Academic Services







2015-2016 Financial Aid by Type












Network Ethernet Switches on Campus

Gbps of Campus Bandwidth





Institutional Research and Assessment

The Office of Institutional Research and Assessment has a staff of five and is responsible for collecting, managing and reporting institutional level data to stakeholders at all levels, while providing business intelligence for university decision makers.




OIRA is using Civitas Learning's Illume product to drive institutional decisions using predictive analytics to support persistence and graduation initiatives. Other modules, including Inspire for Advisors and Inspire for Faculty will be utilized to support student advisement and early interventions.

OIRA enhanced the university credit hour production dashboard to not only report CHP and enrollment but to incorporated filters that will provide additional insights into areas such as full-time equivalency, online enrollment, student status and departmental trends.

OIRA also enhanced the university's online assessment reporting system by creating easy to use dashboards with filters that include academic year and department to provide trend analysis and additional insights into how well the institution meets the needs of its students.

Dashboards for both are located in Tableau Server.



- Grants Level 16






Institutional Effectiveness


Comprehensive System of Continuous Improvement

Of the 110 academic and administrative units within the university, 27% have undergone a PRISM workshop, 21% have completed the workshop and are finalizing their plans, and 9 units are currently undergoing the Program Review process. In all, 37% of all administrative and academic units are working on updating their plans in preparation for the SACSCOC 5th Year Interim Report.









Stephenson Hall Usage by Fiscal Year






Top 10 First-Time Transfer Students from All Colleges and Universities








Enrollment by Alabama County - Fall 2016





Enrollment by Georgia County - Fall 2016






Enrollment in Southeastern U.S. Region - Fall 2016





Enrollment in the Continental United States - Fall 2016





