Executive Summary Library Science Collection Assessment

INTRODUCTION

The Library Science collection is adequate to support the courses taught in both the Master's and Education Specialist programs in Library Media and the Bachelor's and Master's programs in Art and Fine Arts, as well as the professional effectiveness and development of the Library faculty and staff. Complete conspectus sheets and checklists are available upon request for a more detailed examination of the collection.

HOLDINGS

The Library Science collection contains **10,623** titles in the CD 921-4280, Z, and ZA call number ranges, including 1,652 e-books. Total monograph expenditures for the Library Science (Call Number range: Z - ZA) from FY 2015/16 – FY 2019/2020 were **\$36,030.71** with 555 new titles added to Library Science (Z) and six titles added to Archives (CD 921-4280). These newer additions comprise 5.28% of the current Library Science collection.

These numbers represent a snapshot of the collection as titles are continually being added and withdrawn for collection maintenance and growth. These numbers do not represent additional titles available through e-book databases.

PERIODICALS AND SERIALS

The Library has access to full-text journals available throughout the Library databases. There are 556 journals available electronically through database subscriptions, which can be found in EBSCO's Publication Finder at http://bit.ly/2z06DjD. The Serials expenditures in support of Library Science for both print and electronic subscriptions and standing orders average \$23,762.03 from FY 2015-16 to FY 2019-20 (see table below).

Expenditures for serials have migrated away from the individual subscription model to the aggregator database model. Dollar amounts spent on aggregator databases cannot be sub-divided into subject categories. In 2019/20, aggregator databases totaled \$318,780.27, which came from the general fund.

DEFINED ACCESS TO ELECTRONIC RESOURCES

Defined access points users to resources through menu options on the Library's homepage by linking the user to quality, highly relevant, electronic resources. Because the Library provides access to electronic journals, documents, e-books, and video databases along with integrated quality websites that encompass the area of Library Science, the Library's electronic collection in this subject is adequate to support the curriculum.

SUMMARY

Strengths:

Total holdings, conspectus evaluation, and checklist comparisons indicate the overall Library Science collection is more than adequate to support the curriculum as well as the professional effectiveness and development of the Library's faculty and staff. Of particular note on the conspectus worksheets are the holdings in the subject areas of: Book industries and trade, Libraries; Bibliography; and Information resources (General). A review of the journal holdings reveals that the Library Science collection is adequate to support the curriculum and the Library's routine work.

Weaknesses:

Total holdings, conspectus evaluations, and checklist comparisons indicate that the weakest areas of the Library Science subject areas are: Paper. Watermarks, etc., Library service agencies, Library handwriting, and National Bibliography for Eastern Hemisphere.

Recommendations:

The growth rate of the Library Science Collection should be maintained in order to continue providing support for the Master's and Education Specialist programs in Library Media, the Bachelor's and Master's programs in Arts and Fine Arts, and the professional effectiveness and development of the Library faculty and staff. The monograph collection should be generally increased, based on budget, with a strong focus on core and outstanding titles. The periodical collection available via databases is substantial and should be maintained. The weak subject areas (noted above) should also be addressed in future additions to the collection.
